The people who come to St. Vincent de Paul are so thankful for all the basic necessities of life. They know what it's like to wonder where their next meal is coming from. The photos in this article are representative of the thousands who



come to us for help. This year, we will serve over 260,000 meals and provide over 30,000 guest nights of shelter for men, women, children and families.



In 2021, we served over 215,000 meals and provided 20,000 guest nights of shelter. That is an explosion of need, and for us those numbers are startling, but we don't serve numbers – we serve people. Everyone we serve has a story

and is so thankful for the help we provide. Thank you for helping us to help so many in need in this difficult economy.

Annually, this wonderful congregation is the single largest contributor of turkeys for our Thanksgiving meal service to those experiencing poverty. Their help is even more critical this year because of the difficult economy.

At St. Vincent de Paul, the most critical *ingredient* in our Thanksgiving recipe is you – our supporters. Our guests are so grateful for the meals you make possible. During these difficult times, we are all called to share God's blessings with the less fortunate. First and foremost, we ask you to join us in praying for those we are blessed to serve. By the end of this year, we will serve over 260,000 meals, so your support is needed as we combat hunger in our area. We also ask you to encourage your family, friends, church or social groups to participate in a collection drive for this worthwhile effort. You can collect these items and donate them by dropping them off at the Baton Rouge Clinic, Albertson's or at the Bishop Ott Shelter located at 1623 Convention Street. Bishop Ott Shelter urgently needed items: toiletry items such as deodorant, soap, shampoo, body wash, lotion and body powder; paper products (napkins, paper towels, toilet paper), disposable cups, plates, bowls, knives, forks, and spoons. We also urgently need twin & Crib size sheets, towels and washcloths, blankets; disposable diapers; men, women, and children's underwear; socks, knit caps, gloves, scarves, and rain gear; and reading glasses (all strengths).

Deacon Randall Waguespack kicked off a Day of Prayer and Service for the alleviation of suffering and the dignity and integrity of all people at the St. Vincent de Paul Dining Room on October 26th. After the small service, volunteers worked together to serve over 400 individuals experiencing poverty by serving meals and visiting with our guests in need. This will become an annual event, and will be one of the many faithful events that will occur at our new St. Louise de Marillac Chapel.

From our beginning in 1865, St. Vincent de Paul has been known for our commitment to Gospel values in serving the most vulnerable. As a unifying force in our community, we are finally able to move forward with our St. Louise de Marillac Chapel because of the generous support of so many people in our community! Although we still have some money to raise, we know that the good Lord and those who follow Him will help us make this happen.

This project is important to the community because individuals who come to us seeking help often ask for a quiet place where they can reflect and pray. When someone is homeless, hungry, or in need, they have a sense of desperation and hopelessness. Many people we serve are experiencing emotional and psychological stress, and they find strength and comfort in prayer and reflection. This chapel will provide our needy guests the opportunity to strengthen their faith and also help them to realize that many of the volunteers that come to serve do so because of their faith. That connection is important in bringing people together.

Many people who volunteer at St. Vincent de Paul do so because of their faith. Over the years, many of our volunteers have said that they came to us hoping to change someone's life and found instead that their own lives were transformed. We continually receive requests from volunteers for a place where they can quietly pray to connect their service to their faith.

Chapels are recognized throughout the world as an important part of daily life. Chapels are on college campuses, hospitals, prisons, funeral homes, military ships, etc. As construction begins on this new chapel, we will work to get the word out to faith communities throughout our area. We already have great participation from local churches and synagogues. Local private and public schools are also very involved with us. Students from schools like St. Joseph Academy, Episcopal, The Dunham School, Catholic High School, St. Michael's, Parkview Baptist, volunteer their time and energy to our St. Vincent de Paul services. Many schools go beyond just volunteering; they establish ongoing projects to benefit those in need.

This chapel will provide these young students the opportunity to connect their faith to action in service to others. It has been our experience that when a young student volunteers at St. Vincent de Paul for the first time, their eyes are opened. Many of them have never experienced poverty, and they are shocked that so many people in our community are hungry and homeless. Our chapel will give these students an opportunity to pray and reflect on their experiences in serving the poor. It will give them an opportunity to assimilate what they have seen and develop ways to respond. Often, when faced with difficulty, faith is strengthened. A chapel provides a place a student can use to grow spiritually.

Some St. Vincent de Paul volunteers have spent over 50 consecutive years in volunteer service. In fact, one volunteer started as a teenager and then served as a volunteer for almost 70 years until his passing. Ask any of these many volunteers why they were so connected and committed and they will tell you that it was because of their faith. Each of us is on a spiritual journey and we are all called to nourish our faith through prayer and action. This chapel will enable us to achieve this most important objective. Keep this project in your prayers, as we build the future at St. Vincent de Paul!

2024 Is Only A Few Weeks Away

Did you know that if you are 70½ years old or older, you can give up to \$100,000 from your IRA directly to St. Vincent de Paul without paying income taxes on the money? The transfer does not generate taxable income or a deduction, so you'll benefit even if you don't itemize your deductions. If you haven't taken your required minimum distribution for 2023, your IRA charitable rollover gift can satisfy all or part of that requirement. If your spouse is 70 ½ years old or older, they can also give up to \$100,000 from their IRA.
